Year 2 have loved learning about Africa. They have studied Ndebele art learning how to use strong geometric patterns, thick black lines and bold colours to represent different African animals. They also made Ndebele bracelets. They all really enjoyed South Africa Day when Mrs Cruickshanks talked to them about living in South Africa. As part of their science curriculum, Year 3 visited Herstmonceux Science Centre. They had a fabulous day learning about forces through lots of 'hands on' investigations.

The children have also been busy learning about the process of fossil formation. They made their own fossils using a dough made out of salt, coffee grinds and water.

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Year 4 have been designing and making Viking longboats as part of their Learning Adventure, The Anglo Saxons and the Vikings.

In Art, year 5 have been learning about batik.

Batik is a technique where wax is used as a resist to a dye or paint. The wax acts as the line and makes a pattern on the fabric.

The children looked at lots of different African batik before sketching their own designs on paper. They copied the design onto cloth and then used hot wax in a canting tool to trace over the lines.

They used paint to create these wonderful hangings.

"I liked learning about Batik and all the different African designs. They use the ideas to make clothes." Oliver

"You put hot wax on the fabric. When it dries, you put a newspaper over it and iron it. The wax soaks up into the newspaper." Elli
