
If you buy books for children online, please use this website and nominate Seaford Primary School as your chosen school. This way, we'll get 25% of your purchases to spend on books for the school.







All children in KS2 use the reading comprehension programme Accelerated Reader. As a customer of Renaissance Learning, that Accelerated Reader is part of, we now have access to an online library called MyON. All children at our school have access to this and if they are in KS1, they will be given a login and password and an introduction to the website by their teacher shortly. The children in KS2 use their Accelerated Reader login and password and can read e-books at home and quiz on them at school. All you need to do is input MyON in a search engine.



On Wednesday 11th October, years 5 and 6 had the opportunity to attend a zoom meeting with author Thomas Taylor. It was a very enjoyable occasion and an insight into Thomas' author life. We have the first book in his Eerie-on-Sea mystery series in the library and the fifth one has just been published. Saving HNon—Chang and the Elephant by Jeet Zdung and Trang Nguyen

The Lion Above the Door by Onjali Q.Rauf


