It is then expected that our Champions promote reading wherever possible through e.g. writing book reviews in our newsletter. Once you've become a Reading Champion, you stay a Champion throughout your time at our school.

What Makes a Branze Reading Champian?


- Excited about being able to decode and recognise new words

- Has excellent awareness of diggerent genres and geatures of texts
- Consistently helps other children with their reading skills (independently)
- · Contributes to assemblies about reading
- Develops reading resources on the learning platform
- Creates quizzes based on their own reading
- Organises reading events
- Is able to read to others with good expression and appropriate pace and tone
- Champions new books and authors and encourages others to try them

- · Achieves very good reading progress

- Continues to develop own reading more challenging texts
- Shares/promotes reading with class/ other year groups

- Participates in any reading initiatives/ competitions etc.

Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver




Bíscuít Bear by Míní Grey
